A WORD FROM OUR NEW PRINCIPAL CHAPLAIN

It was with a mixture of sadness at his departure and yet with thanksgiving for his ministry that we farewelled the Reverend Tom Hill on 24th August. With Liz, he moves into an active retirement on the Central Coast - active in recreation, and in caring for the Anglican congregations at Point Clare and Mangrove Mountain.
